Walker Learning at Pingelly Primary School

The Walker Learning Approach is a philosophy of teaching and learning that spans from preschool through to the lower, middle and upper primary years. At Pingelly Primary School we are implementing Walker Learning in the Kindy and Pre-Primary classes, to begin with.

The Walker Learning Approach is a pedagogy that underpins everything that happens in a day, a week and a year – and informs every moment of the teacher's intention to teach (planning, scaffolding, modelling, observing and directing). The classroom environment has defined spaces for learning – individual, small group and large group – that have all materials, resources and equipment provided. Individual records and observations are taken of the children in relationship to learning objectives and their development. Opportunities for individual interests are provided by the teacher. Positive relationships between students, teachers and families are vitally important.

What does this mean for the Kindy and Pre-Primary classes?

There are some core elements of Walker Learning that are being implemented in Kindy and Pre-Primary. These include:

Investigations - a block of time every morning that has hands-on experiences that allow for students to explore previously taught concepts and give students the time and space to explore their interests, that then are used as a springboard into the more formal teaching of the day. Investigations experiences are planned intentionally by the teacher and build on the development of the child, family and community interests and events and school curriculum.

Focus Child - The focus child of the day works with the teacher for a short time – building relationships, consolidating skills and reviewing concepts. The teacher makes notes throughout the day on specific developmental observations – socially, emotionally, language, physical and cognitive domains.

Reporter and Photographer - two children are chosen daily to be the Reporter and Photographer. They are directed by the teacher to a task during investigations and they are required to share during Reflections what they achieved. An example of this may be: Photographer – find and photograph collections of '5'; or the Reporter – report on what happens in the Block Corner during Investigations.

Tuning in and Reflection - Tuning in involves reflection and revision of literacy, numeracy and social intentions for the week; Focus child, Reporter and Photographer tasks and scaffolding in front of the group, and intentional direction to areas of the classroom for learning opportunities. Reflection time is the 'springboard' into formal teaching and includes reviewing tasks by Focus Child, Reporter and Photographer, the teacher modelling skills and concepts from Investigations and acknowledging freebies – children who demonstrated skill or achievement during their learning; followed by resetting the environment for the rest of the day.

What does Mrs Lee think? : "I have found the Walker Learning Approach has enabled me to build really strong & secure relationships with my students. Investigation Time also supports the formal literacy and numeracy lessons that occur during the rest of the day, as the children love to repeat and practice newly learned skills and knowledge, and share their learning with others.

What does Mrs Bassett think? : "The Walker Learning Approach allows the students the time and space to explore their interests and practice their skills in fun and enjoyable experiences. The students settle quickly into Investigations and are demonstrating their skills through playful learning. Their engagement in the activities and their growth in developmental domains is evident."
