Connect and Respect

Violence is a complex issue, influenced by many factors — but bringing it into our public schools is unacceptable. While the overwhelming majority of students and families demonstrate care and respect towards their peers and school staff, it is important to be clear: we are committed to protecting our school community from any form of violence or aggression, whether from students or family members. Just as parents are their children's most influential role models at home, we as educators also play a critical role in modelling respectful behaviour at school. The conduct of students is strongly influenced by the actions and interactions of the adults around them. Our words, tone, and behaviour all shape the learning environment. Parents and staff working together is the most effective way to prevent bullying, harassment, discrimination, and violence in our schools. At Pingelly Primary School every staff member and student has the right to feel safe every day. Violence and bullying will not be tolerated and I ask that you continue to work with us in leading by example. Building respectful relationships with staff not only fosters a positive and inclusive school culture but also shows our students the kind of engagement we expect them to have with all members of our community. Maths Focus ÷ 📐

This term, we are exploring Measurement and Data & Statistics. These units offer hands-on opportunities for learning, including activities connected to our gardening and cooking experiences.

Each Maths session begins with a Daily Review. This is a teaching strategy that helps students reinforce previously learned skills, improve recall, and build a strong foundation for new concepts.

English 📖📚

We are currently practising elements of narrative writing, with a focus on:

- Writing descriptive sentences
- Building strong characters
- Organising events in a logical order

Our narrative writing assessment will take place in Week 6. After this, we will begin a new unit on informational texts, where students will learn how to research and write factual reports.

HASS (Humanities and Social Sciences) 🌍

- Year 3: Students are working in Geography, extending their History knowledge by exploring the states and territories of Australia.
- Year 4: Students are investigating the experiences of different people in the past, including First Nations Australians, and how these experiences have influenced Australian communities today.

Science – Biological Sciences 🌱🔬

In Science, we are learning about living things, their life cycles, and how they adapt to their environments. Students are enjoying hands-on investigations and nature-based learning experiences.

Health ❤️🧠

Our Health unit this term is based on the message: "We all have the right to feel safe at all times."

This important theme focuses on personal safety and respectful relationships. We look forward to a fantastic second half of the term ahead!

13 YARN



13YARN has a dedicated team committed to crisis support and supporting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people experiencing a crisis, helping to prevent self-harm and suicide. During a call we remove cultural barriers, stigma, shame, guilt, or the feeling of helplessness by allowing a person in crisis who calls our support line a moment to be heard and validated, without judgment. Although we do not ask for personal information when engaging with a caller, we can call 000 if an emergency is unfolding to protect the individual. If the situation is already an emergency, please call 000 directly.

We don't label a crisis; we are open and responsive to all forms of crisis and triggers that can overwhelm an individual.

Some examples of common calls we receive are:

- Homelessness
- Family breakdown or domestic violence
- Economic challenges
- Abuse
- Suicide ideation and self-harm
- Mental health
- Loneliness and isolation
- Discrimination
- Bullying

We can assist in many ways, such as:

- Easily accessed 24/7 and free to call from any landline or mobile phone.
- Fully confidential and do not ask for names and personal details.
- No appointment needed as we operate as an over-the-phone crisis support service, not a face-to-face counselling service, we do not take clients or provide ongoing counselling for individuals.
- Calls answered in under a minute.
- Reconnect help seekers by referring them back to existing services or connecting them to new services in their area or nationally if requested.
- Add our service to an existing safety care plan or we can create a safety care plan to assist individuals who are overwhelmed to help navigate their day and empower them to reconnect with loved ones, a friend or services, to help continue their day or evening.
- 13YARN does not replace other services or existing supports; we offer support over the phone to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people of all ages in crisis or when feeling a crisis is coming on.
- We provide a culturally safe space for callers.

HELPING CHILDREN WITH LANGUAGE DIFFICULTIES DURING THE TRANSITION TO HIGH SCHOOL

YouthCARE and Curtin University are researching how language difficulties affect children's mental health as they move from primary to secondary school. This transition can be stressful, particularly for students who struggle with reading or communication.

Who Can Participate?

Year 6 students across Australia, along with their parents/caregivers, are invited to take part in a one-time assessment of language, literacy, and emotional wellbeing.

How It Works:

- The assessment takes 1-2 hours and can be done online or in person. A trained research assistant is present to assist the child with the assessment.
- Parents complete a short survey while staying near their child.
- Families can receive a non-diagnostic report on their child's language and literacy results.
- A follow-up happens in Year 7 to track progress.
- If results indicate a concern, a registered psychologist will offer guidance.

Important Information:

Schools are not involved in sharing student data. Parents may choose to share results with their child's school. The research team organises all assessments directly with families.


